
2 Corinthians 1:3-5 (PASSION)

Simone Weil on "The Love of God and Affliction"

Simone Weil (1909-1943; pronounced "vay") was born into a Jewish family in Paris and enjoyed a fairly comfortable upbringing. Yet she developed altruistic tendencies early on and grew up to be a pacifist at heart. At a young age, she decided to dedicate her life to uplifting

the social conditions of the downtrodden and underprivileged. A brilliant student at school, she was a voracious reader with an insatiable appetite for knowledge. After completing her studies, she began her career as a teacher. She was a professed pacifist and was passionately involved in political activism. She also had a deep interest in mysticism and was drawn to the Christian faith. A woman of frail health, she developed tuberculosis in 1943 and died at the young age of 34.




And it is indispensable to know how to look at him in a certain way.


